



A Shift to Plant-Rich Production

FARM ADAPTATION NETWORK 2025 PROJECTS





The Farm Adaptation Summit in October 2025 in Copenhagen will put farmers at the heart of agricultural transformation by showcasing farmer-led adaptation success stories to the farming industry.



The Blueprint offers policy recommendations, business guidance, and grant mapping for NGOs, farming organisations, government agencies and companies. It will be published in January 2026.



The Farm Adaptation Research

Collective (FARC) is a collective of researchers (academic researchers, research fellows and PhD students) working in different fields related to farm adaptation.



The UK Farm Adaptation Work Group was created to make partnerships with agricultural and food groups around the issue of the transition to a plant-forward food system. Roundtables were held through 2026 to listen to stakeholders.



LAUNCH OF FAN UK AND UK ROUNDTABLES

In April 2025, the first UK roundtable brought together allied food and animal welfare experts to discuss how to create a coalition around the transition to plant-rich farming. The group co-created the 'Farm Adaptation Working Group' to work on a UK Plant-Based Action Plan. A further procurement roundtable in September 2025 allowed supply chain experts to workshop questions around plant-rich food service. With another four roundtables scheduled for this year, the data will be used for the UK Farm Adaptation Blueprint

EUROPEAN STRATEGIC BLUEPRINT PART ONE PUBLISHED

Blueprint Part One is a comprehensive research document that identifies and analyzes the major challenges and barriers preventing farm adaptation in Europe. It examines five key barrier categories: attitudinal and behavioral challenges, economic and financial constraints, research and innovation gaps, environmental and technical limitations, and sociopolitical obstacles. Part One serves as the foundational analysis that will inform Part Two—due in January 2026—which will present practical solutions, policy recommendations, and real-world farmer case studies for supporting the transition toward more sustainable, plant-rich agricultural practices.




